Summer Reading 2022

WHY READ DURING THE SUMMER?

To keep your skills sharp... It's good for you!

University of Tennessee, Knoxville, faculty members Richard Allington and Anne McGill-Franzen completed in 2010 a three-year study showing a significantly higher level of reading achievement in students who did summer reading. They found that children who do not read in the summer lose two to three months of reading development while kids who do read tend to gain a month of reading proficiency.

Research shows that reading just twenty minutes a day drastically improves school performance, vocabulary, thinking skills and reading skills. Research also demonstrates that choice makes a very important contribution to achievement, so we will allow you a choice within a limited range of books.

Below you will find the necessary information for your summer reading assignment. For summer 2022, the Theology Department is leading the program.

For this assignment, students in grades 10-11 will choose one of the following books from their respective lists, obtain a copy, and read the book. Next, students will write a reflection essay connecting the content of the book to **two (2)** of the Xaverian spiritual values described below.

Please note that the reading below only applies to grades 10-11. Students in grade 9 have a separate assignment. **JUNIORS enrolled in AP English Language and/or AP Seminar are exempt from completing this assignment.**

1. OBTAIN A COPY OF THE BOOK

2. IDENTIFY TWO (2) XAVERIAN SPIRITUAL VALUES AS THEMES IN THE BOOK

A theme is a central, unifying idea that that helps the reader to understand something about themself and their world through the reading experience. This year, we are asking you to choose **two (2)** of the Five Spiritual Values of Malden Catholic High School and the Xaverian Brothers and think about how the values are exemplified in this book.

The Five Spiritual Values you may choose from are:

Simplicity – simplicity calls us to focus on what truly matters most in our lives: family, faith, friends, and the common good of humanity. Simplicity frees our hearts and minds to choose good and work for justice.

Humility – humility is the recognition that God is the source of all good things in our lives. When we are humble, we adopt a selfless attitude and recognize that our brothers and sisters are all made in God's image. In humility, we recognize that we are not perfect, and do not always have all the answers. Humility inspires us to be connected to each other and calls us to affirm each other's gifts, learn from each other, and work together in harmony.

Compassion – compassion means having a tender heart capable of seeing and hearing the needs of all. Simply put, it means seeing people how Jesus saw them. In compassion, we are called to stand with one another in difficulties, especially with the poor, vulnerable, and oppressed, recognizing that all of us are called to experience and share God's love. Compassion allows us to be the eyes, the ears, and the hands of God in the world today.

Trust – trust is total confidence in our God and our brothers and sisters. Trust is where our minds meet our hearts, and it calls us to act with faith and courage. Trust allows us to persevere in the faith of life's difficulties and draws us more closely to our brothers and sisters as we live out God's desires for our lives.

Zeal – zeal is a joyful and enthusiastic embrace of the life that God has given us. It means to give ourselves over to our good work wholeheartedly and without reservation. Zeal empowers us to have an intense passion for bringing about the more abundant life that Jesus proclaimed. The value of zeal helps us to recognize that special things are only achieved with hard work, effort, and commitment.

3. WRITE A REFLECTION PAPER

- At least 750 words. You do not need a cover page, just a three-line heading with your Name, Date Completed, and Theology Teacher (when you receive this).
- Essays should be double spaced, one-inch margins, standard 11 or 12 point font.
- You must include the following:
 - Provide an overview of the book's content and the purpose of the book, as you understand it. This should be no more than 150 words.
 - Select two (2) of the Five Spiritual Values listed and described above and explain how the book illustrates the spiritual values that you selected. Make clear which values you choose, and use at least 4 direct quotations or examples, with the page numbers from the text, to support your choice. 400-500 words.
 - Finish your essay by explaining how this book has helped you better understand the spiritual values you chose, and how you are looking forward to living out these values at Malden Catholic this year. 200-300 words.

OTHER IMPORTANT INFORMATION

- Your Reflection Essay is due on the Friday of the first week of school (September 9) to your Theology teacher.
- Your grade for the summer reading assignment will go into the gradebook as a Quarter 1 test grade for your Theology class.
